# **New Zealand Trial Championship**

Three properties were used for the 2020 Marlborough Motorcycles New Zealand Trial Championship: Manderley Farm for day 1, the top part of Latham's farm at Western Valley for day 2 and the back valley at Graylees Road for day 3. Paul Jackson, Derek Scott, Rob McKay, Shane Brons and Paul Mountstevens put in many hours before the event preparing the sections with help from other club members. Shane Hubbard also made a big contribution with his chainsaw expertise. Rat was the clerk of the course for the event along with the stewards: Peter Barnett, Sandra and Roy Hallie, and John Ravenscroft compiled the results. 68 riders entered for the event and 13 of these were mini riders. This was the second year that classes for mini riders have been included at the nationals and they were riding on separate sections which Simon Jones and Paul had set.

## Expert (orange)

It has been two years since Dylan Ball last rode in Canterbury and he is now at a much higher level after riding in the world rounds in 2019. Dylan won all three days and also took out the NZ Experts, but it wasn't all smooth sailing. On day 2 he had a crash and broke the clutch perch which his dad Nick had to swap out during the trial. And then he had a brake problem and had to ride the last five sections without a front brake because he was running tight on time and couldn't afford another stop to sort it out.

On day 3 he had some strong competition from Warren Laugesen. Warren who last rode at the nationals in 2011 was improving each day and his second lap at Graylees was better than Dylan's. There was only one point separating them as they set off to ride the 12 sections for the final time. On this lap Dylan lost 16 points to Warren's 21 and finished the day 6 points ahead, but it was a very good ride by Warren.

Jules was in the mix too. He was second on day 1, and a close third behind Warren on day 2.

## Expert (red)

There were three entries for the red line but Tauranga's Flynn Godsell had problems with the rear tyre rolling off the rim of his 4RT and didn't finish on days 1 and 2. Blake Fox took first place and David Trewin was second. Blake has now won this class three times.

#### Intermediate

Brad Hibbs dominated the inters, winning all three days to finish ahead of Kevin Pinfold and Paul Mountstevens who had a real battle for runner up. On day one Kevin was one point ahead of Paul on observation. On day 2 both had the same score with Paul getting the nod on a countback. On day 3 it could have gone either way and it was lap 2 that decided it. Kevin lost only 4 points for the lap while Paul dropped 13. Jason Hibbs, Kevin Gundry, James Snowden and Josh Stones were also riding well and were close to the leading group. Snowy was unlucky to have problems with his 4 stroke Beta on day one and had to revert to his Rev 3 for days 2 and 3. Glenn Smith would have also been among them but had to retire after day 1 due to the ongoing back problems he has had this year and Neil Belvoir was unable to ride on day 2 due to injury. Hamish Barnett made the step up to this class along with Clark Fountain. Clark has only ridden one club trial and he was on Jules' GasGas 200 loan bike, so his ride at this level was remarkable. The two main contenders for the women's title: Hannah Rushworth and Gabby Gundry were both riding intermediate. Hannah was an impressive 7<sup>th</sup> overall and Gabby was 14<sup>th</sup>.

#### **President and Sportsman**

Brendon Wordsworth and Ray Skinner were the two main contenders in president and they finished on same score on day 1 which Brendon won on a countback. Ray was first on day 2, so they both started the third day with a chance to win it. Brendon had a better day than Ray to take the overall win.

In sportsman it was similar with Ross Bristol and Kahu Jones also having a close contest. Ross was first on day 1, and Kahu first on day 2. On the third day they both finished on the same score but Kahu won on the countback. Kahu has been riding well in club trials this season and it was great to see him achieve this result. As well as winning the class he also got a mention and his photo in the November issue of Ixion's Cycle Torque.

## Clubman

The old master Warwick Merriman was too good on all 3 days, but the other two podium places were closely contested with Warren Day and Peter Robson coming through as the second and third placegetters. Lachie Columb riding in first trial and on a brand new Sherco was second on day 3. Christine Thompson bravely completed the 3 days despite feeling very unwell with a head cold.

#### Junior

Dylan, Clark and Kahu finished in that order based on VCS.

#### Twin shock

Simon Jones rode the green line on his Honda TLR to win the class. Jim Henderson (Fantic) and Stephen Reij (Ossa) rode blue and were 2nd and 3rd respectively. All three did well to complete the demanding trial on their twin shocks.

#### Minis

11 year old Finn Pearce won Mini A (electric). Finn is also the North Island champion and is a keen young rider who will be worth watching in future, as will Abe Herbert, younger brother of Daniel, who won the Mini A petrol class. Evie Hubbard rode very well to win Mini B (electric). Evie was third on day 1, but won the next two days and finished ahead of the three boys she was competing with. Hine Jones won the Mini C petrol class and Leo Hopkins did well to complete the 3 days on his little Beta electric.

## A Waikato perspective

Four tired Waikato Trials riders sit and reflect on a weekend of competition at the Marlborough Motorcycles NZ Moto Trials Championships, here in Canterbury, late afternoon on Labour day. The 3 days of competition took place at 3 different venues close to Little River on Banks Peninsula. There are some sublime properties for MotoTrials in this area and we were treated once again, in 2020, to a wonderful array of terrain and challenges set out and administered by the Pioneer MCC. The hills were steep and grippy and mostly strewn with rocks while the creeks were challenging with every size of boulder imaginable, but mostly grippy by comparison to what we find at some of our Waikato venues. Sixty-eight competitors from throughout NZ fought battles with the terrain and obstacles in the congenial fashion that is prevalent in our sport. Temperatures on Saturday and Sunday caused competitors to wilt a little in contrast to the cooler and dampish Monday which suited the author better and reduced dust levels. Each rider entered the "fray" with their own personal "battles", and it was interesting to watch our top three expert riders launch themselves and their bikes at the seemingly impossible "obstacles" and most often conquer the challenge with precision and courage. It was good to see Warren Laugesen from Hawkes Bay back to his old superior form but although he pushed our "whiz-kid", Dylan Ball to "the wire" he had to settle for runner up to Dylan. Jules Huguenin from Pioneer came in a creditable third for the weekend. Hannah Rushworth from Manawatu showed how it's done in the Women's class, and also to more than half of her male counterparts, while major sponsor Brendon Wadsworth managed top spot in the Presidents class and Simon Jones, Brad Hibbs, Kahu Jones and Warwick Merriman won their respective support classes. Well done all.

Waikato riders to gain podium finishes were Peter Osborne achieving 3rd in the President class and Jim Henderson a 2nd in the Twin Shock class.

The highlight of the event for me was the comradery, enthusiasm and skill levels of the newly formed minis that contested this, and last year's, NZ Moto Trials champs. These youngsters, on their predominantly electric powered motorcycles, impressed in every way with their sportsmanship, ability and enthusiasm. I won't mention winners because in my view they are all winners but as a senior Moto Trials rider I would like to sincerely welcome the Burns, Furness, Pearce, Treloar, Herbert, Jones, Hubbard, Hopkins and Robson families to the sport of Moto Trials and hope that your numbers grow when others are infected with your passion. Hamilton MCC will host the NZ championships on Labour weekend in 2021 and we hope that we can duplicate the standards that were enjoyed in Canterbury this weekend. Thank you Pioneer.

Those Pioneers, the mavericks of the south, sure know how to throw a party. This year's National was no exception: excellent affair, top notch organisation, good venues, can't go wrong. We were spoiled, as usual, with dry weather but even that contributed to the challenge, especially on Day 2, with the dirt turning to powder and traction an issue. All up, it was yet another well-run, challenging and rewarding event. **Phil Costello**

## Kaikoura 3 day, 13-15 November

With the Kaikoura being held three weeks after the nationals we were expecting numbers to be down this year so it was good to have entries from 42 riders and 3 sidechair crews. Twelve riders from the North Island came down for the event including Kevin Pinfold, Kim Pedersen, Neil Sturmfels and Connor Newton who had ridden at the nationals.

The sections at Trewins and Dairy Farm Road were set the weekend before by two teams led by Peter Dunn and Peter Barnett and during the week Tui Scott and Dave Chambers set Mt Fyffe. Patrick and Ross were the officials for the weekend.

#### Expert

The expert class had a different look this year with Blake absent, Jules opting to compete in sidechairs and David unable to ride the 3 days because Friday wasn't a holiday in Kaikoura. Kevin Pinfold and Paul Mountstevens had another head to head carrying on from where they left off at the nationals. On day one and day two they both had the same scores, but this time it was Paul who had the better third day. Tom Beedles was third, riding again after recovering from the injury that prevented him from competing in the nationals, and Kahu rode the red line for the first time as he continues his progress up through the grades.

#### Intermediate

There was also a very close contest in the inters with John leading Ross by 1 mark at the end of day 2, and Kevin Tither also in contention after a very good second day. When John had a five on the fourth lap on day 3, he thought that he had lost his chance of winning but meanwhile Ross was having problems when the Sherco began misfiring on lap 2, which ended his chance of catching John and unfortunately meant that he dropped down the order overall.

#### President

After being away for 3 months in the North Island working on a boat, Tui was back in the South Island for a few days for the Kaikoura and he rode well to win the class from Derek Pike.

#### **Clubman A**

In the clubbies it was a case of youth versus experience. Dave Chambers is fifty years older than Connor Newton who is only 13 years old and they both finished on 14 points at the end of the 3 days, and they each had the same number of cleans, dabs, twos and threes. Connor also rode well in the clubman class at the nationals and he is another young rider who will progress up the grades in the next year or two. Christine Thompson and Shirley McDonald also had good rides during the weekend. Christine was first on day 1, and Shirley was first on day 3.

## Clubman B

It was also another close one in clubman B with Wayne and Dick finishing on 8 points each. Wayne dropped down to the B line this year because of an injury he had at a classic trial. Hannah Newton, Connor's older sister, and Jye Cormack were riding in their first Kaikoura and we hope to see them back again next year.

## Twin shock

Tony Smith riding John Lawton's TY250C was the winner of this class. Stephen Reij (Ossa) and Peter Hosking (Fantic) were both pleased to finish the weekend after their bikes had overheated on the long, hot second day at Dairy Farm Road.

## Sidechair

The Rat/Emma; Rob/Laura and two Johnnies sidechair teams were absent this year but three other teams entered. Kendall and Hamish were on the Honda, and it was something of a novelty to have a 4 stroke in the field. Jules had teamed up with Neil, who told us at the signon on Thursday evening that he had had some chair experience in the USA a few years ago; and Derek had a new swinger Ella, Paul's daughter.

Kendall and Hamish had been getting some practice in at classic trials during the year and it showed on days 1 and 2 which they won comfortably, but by day 3 Jules and Neil had worked out what they needed to do and it was much closer. And their good effort that day also put them ahead of Derek and Ella who had been in second place after two days. We have heard that Jules intends having another go, and if Kendall/Hamish and Scotty/Ella and the old campaigners return it will be very interesting next year ...

# Fred Haworth

We don't know a lot about our early club members so when Joss Richardson contacted Peter Dunn recently it was interesting to find out about one of them. Joss' grandfather was Fred Haworth who joined the club when it was formed in 1914. Fred was a cycle mechanic at

the time of his marriage in 1907 and later had a car repair workshop in Tuam Street in partnership with Frank Thomas.

In 1912 he set a New Zealand flying mile record and he rode in and won several Pioneer events from 1914 to the early 1920s. He was the first winner of the Bonnington Cup in 1917 and he won it again the following year. He also had success at grass track meetings on a machine that he called "scrapheap". This 350cc hybrid had a Triumph bottom end and an ohv head that he had manufactured himself. It was quicker than the 500 and 600cc bikes he was racing against.

His family remember that he was always cracking a joke and making them laugh. One of their memories is when he was driving them to Hanmer and the car spun on the shingle road and did a complete 180 ending up facing the way they had come.



# Russell (Rusty) Gillard, 1945-2020

Russell was a motorcycling legend in Christchurch for decades.

In 1962 at the age of 17 he began riding in the novice class at Pioneer trials and that year was also the beginning of his long association with the Kaikoura 3 day trial which would continue through to 1996. He was the first rider to win the road bike class at Kaikoura when it was introduced in 1968 on his Greeves 250 and for many years he was the organiser and spokesman for the road class, setting sections and arranging accommodation.

Ian Miles recalls that Russell rode the Greeves on the road, road-raced and scrambled it and used it on road trials. He was also one of the early converts to Jap bikes, in 1971 he bought a Suzuki TS250 Savage. He rode this to success for several years in the new trail bike class at Kaikoura. In the first year 1971 he was second in the class to Gary Rush on a Suzuki 125 and

ahead of John Boote of a Suzuki 90. For the record he also won that year's infamous drag through the inland shingle road ahead of Evan Holmes and Terry Young.

Russell also scrambled the Suzuki and later bikes in the 1970s and was a member of the South Island team for the annual North v South moto cross in 1973. Later he had Yamaha TTs and XTs. Murray Waters remembers Russell winning the trail bike series at Ruapuna on an XT500. Russell borrowed Murray's bike for the final round because his own bike was in pieces. He needed to finish in the top few to clinch the series which he did.



Russell is probably best remembered for his contribution to the various clubs that he belonged to. He was heavily involved at the Canterbury Auto Cycle Club organising road racing. That took him onto the ACU as a steward and other positions and for many years he was a constant presence at all sorts of bike events ... always giving, caring, and having time to talk, always one of the nicest guys in motorcycling. The ACU work also took him to speedway and again for decades he was an official presence there, and was president of the Canterbury Speedway Association for a period in the 1980s.

Russell was a little giant of motorcycling in Christchurch and is a great loss to the sport.
